Frank Caro 1936-2020

As we celebrate re-emerging and re-engaging, it is only fitting that we pay

tribute to our founder and long-time guiding force, Frank Caro, who served with Ruthann Dobek as BrooklineCAN Co-Chair from its inception in 2010 until his death in in 2020.


Frank never stopped engaging and advised all of us to get involved in civic affairs, to recognize the things that work well and to improve the things that do not. He believed that we multiply our individual accomplishments by connecting with others in the community as he did as a Town Meeting Member for 16 years and a member of the Town Advisory Committee for 7 years.

Instrumental in making Brookline the first community in New England to be designated an age-friendly city by the UN World Health Organization, he championed programs for older residents which benefit everyone, including the creation of a Pedestrian Advisory Committee which he initially chaired, the placement of benches along Beacon Street, and consideration of pedestrian-friendly street lighting in Town planning.

Frank was also President of the Board of Directors of the Friends of Hall's Pond Sanctuary where he indulged his passion for gardening by developing and running a seasonal bi-weekly volunteer maintenance crew.

In recognition of his leadership and commitment to BrooklineCAN, the community service partnership awards are named in his honor.

She is an accomplished musician whose love of music enhances her interactions with people of all ages and diverse backgrounds.
