Brookline Age-Friendly City Committee

Accomplishments in 2017-18 and Plans for 2019

The Brookline Age-Friendly City Committee is co-chaired by Frank Caro, co-chair of Brookline CAN; Ruthann Dobek, Director of Brookline Senior Center and Council on Aging, and Co-Chair of Brookline CAN; and Nancy Heller, Select Board. The committee meets regularly at town hall with citizen participation and representation from town departments.

In 2012, Brookline became the first municipality in New England to be admitted to the World Health Organization's Network of Age-Friendly Cities and Communities. Brookline based its application on a broad assessment of its age-friendly features. In joining the network, Brookline committed itself to a comprehensive, multi-year effort to strengthen its age-friendly status. Age-Friendly Brookline is a collaboration of the Town of Brookline, the Council on Aging, and BrooklineCAN formed to respond to the needs of Brookline's senior population.

The Brookline Council on Aging and BrooklineCAN are the leaders and catalysts for issues impacting older adults. The Brookline Council on Aging, a town department, is responsible for planning, coordinating, and providing comprehensive services to Brookline residents over the age of 60. Brookline Community Aging Network (BrooklineCAN) is a member-driven, volunteer organization primarily for older Brookline residents that promote services and activities to enable independent living and improved quality of life. Both organizations collaborate with town departments to ensure older adults are a priority in the Town of Brookline.

This document provides a progress report on 2017 and 2018 accomplishments as well as 2019 goals. Our focus areas include Housing, transportation, property tax relief, employment opportunities, parks and open space, disability and diversity, public health, recreation, public safety, information dissemination, and veteran's services.

Housing	A Select Board committee has studied the feasibility of an affordable senior housing development above the town-owned parking lot between Kent Street and Station Street in Brookline Village. In January 2019, the committee recommended that the Select Board issue an RFP. We supported the Jewish Community Housing for the Elderly's proposal for an affordable senior housing development on the Temple KI site on Harvard Street near Coolidge Corner. Supported exploration of an accessory dwelling unit bylaw. The exploration was put on hold pending state legislation that would make it easier to amend local zoning bylaws. Supported public education through BrooklineCAN on home sharing among senior home owners with extra space in their homes.	Continue to advance the proposal for the Kent Street-Station affordable senior housing development. Explore other opportunities for affordable senior housing, including possible use of air-rights above other Town-owned parking lots. Support adoption of an accessory dwelling unit bylaw in Brookline. Through public education, encourage home sharing arrangements among older homeowners with extra space in their homes.
Transportation	TRIPPS, an advisory service offering information on local travel options (other than driving), services Brookline and Newton residents. The program was supported for 3 years by grants from the Massachusetts Department of Transportation. In 2018, TRIPPS supported 18 public events in Brookline that reached 349 individuals. These included classes on ridesharing and information sessions on public and private transportation options available to Brookline seniors. emotional loss many can feel upon giving up driving and working through the options available to them as they made this transition. In 2018, TRIPPS was cited as a model program by the Governor's Council to Address Aging Issues in Massachusetts.

The Pedestrian Advisory Committee appointed by the Transportation Board has established itself quickly as an active participant in Town transportation policy. The Age-Friendly City committee supported BrooklineCAN in its advocacy for the formation of the committee.

The Town adopted a Complete Streets policy that includes strong features to support pedestrians.

The Transportation Department is seeking Complete Streets funding for some projects to support pedestrians such as new crosswalks and pedestrian-activated flashing signs at intersections.

Persuade the Town to establish a program to assure that benches are provided at regular intervals along sidewalks that are important for pedestrian transportation.

Persuade the Town to provide more extensive pedestrian-friendly street lighting in densely populated areas.

Assure that a portion of the Town's revenues from assessments on ride sharing services are used to subsidize local transportation for older and disabled adults who do not drive.

Advocate for adequate funding for the BETS program as long as the Brookline taxi industry remains viable.

Conduct a survey of BETS program users to determine options to assure their continued access to adequate transportation.

Property tax relief for senior homeowners

The Board of Assessors is now able to offer a reduced interest rate on deferred property taxes for qualifying senior homeowners with the goal of increasing participation. The interest rate is tied to the one-year average of 10-year US Treasury constant maturity rate. For 2018 the rate was 2.33%. In 2018, the Town successfully petitioned the State Legislature to adopt a Home Rule Petition for the Town of Brookline to increase the

Increase the number of positions available in the property tax work-off program for senior homeowners.

Continue replenishing the tax aid fund and provide relief to financially insecure adults who apply.

annual income limit to qualify for the

new income limit is tied to the Senior
Circuit Breaker income tax program,
which is indexed annually by the
State Revenue Department.
The third leg of the stool built to aid
senior property taxpayers was
completed; the formation of a
Taxation Aid Fund and Taxation Aid
Committee. The purpose of the Fund
and the Committee is to identify and
assist senior or disabled taxpayers in
need of tax payment relief. The
Taxation Aid Committee includes the
Tax Collector, Tax Assessor and three
additional members appointed by the
Town's Select Board. The Committee
is also supported by the Council on
Aging and the Town's Senior Center
staff in identifying potential
applicants. The Fund is supported by
volunteer contributions solicited
during the tax billing process.

Parks and Open Space

The Age-Friendly City Committee and the Parks and Open Space Division published a brochure on age-friendly features of Brookline's public park, funded by JF&CS.

Completed renovation of the Brookline Avenue Playground including companion seating, accessible entrances, pathways and benches.

Added a public bench along the public way outside Billy Ward Playground to provide a place to rest for people walking to Town Hall or Brookline Village.

Completed the renovation of Emerson Garden, which included accessibility improvements, along with seating in the sun and shade.

Completed renovation of the Emerald Necklace Bicycle and Pedestrian Pathway on Brookline Avenue including accessible ramps to the MBTA stop and crossing at Aspinwall Avenue.

Completed the Police Department Tribute Garden & Seating Area that
